

CKYO Borchardt Concerto Competition 2021-2022

CKYO reserves the right to alter or amend these rules at any time up to the start of the competition.

Competition Date: Sunday, December 12, 2021 Location: Singletary Center for the Arts – Recital Hall

Repertoire Approval due: Monday, November 1, 2021 Competition Application due: Monday, November 22, 2021

Eligibility:

- All CKYO students in good standing (i.e., all forms, signatures, tuition turned in) are eligible to participate provided that they were members of CKYO at any time during the 2019-2020 and/or the 2020-2021 seasons and <u>have never previously won the CKYO</u> <u>Concerto Competition</u>.
- Prior to submitting the application for the Competition, the student must complete the <u>Concerto Competition Approval Form</u> and receive approval from the CKYO Music Director. Please submit your pieces for approval by the Music Director as early as possible as there may be reasons why a piece is not approved for the competition even if you believe it meets all qualifications listed below.
- The application fee (\$35), one copy of the solo part for the piece the student plans to perform with all markings and or cuts that have been approved by the Music Director, and the application form must be received by CKYO by **November 22, 2021** in order for a student to participate. <u>APPLY HERE</u>.
- Small-group pieces (double- and triple-concerti, for example) are acceptable.
- Each student is allowed only ONE entry per year, even if that entry is a small-group piece.
- A student may audition on a different instrument instead of the one he/she plays in CKYO (e.g., a CKYO violinist may audition to play a piano concerto).

Format:

- The tentative competition date will be Sunday, December 12, 2021; all applicants must perform that day in order to be eligible; there will be no make-ups or videotaped auditions.
- All students must play with piano accompaniment. An accompanist is NOT provided by <u>CKYO</u>.



- Performances will be in random order. If a student is unavailable at a particular time, he or she must so indicate on the application. Every effort will be made to accommodate these needs, but not all needs can be accommodated. Times will be scheduled between 2:00pm-6:00pm.
- The judges will make written comments and at the end of the evening will decide the winners. The CKYO music director will write comments but will NOT participate in selection of the winners.
- The judges' decision will be based NOT on the difficulty of the pieces or on how advanced the performers may be; the decision will be based solely on the quality of the performances.
- The judges will select <u>UP</u> to three (3) winners and the results will be emailed to all CKYO members and their families by 9:00pm on the day the competition is held (December 12, 2021).
- The student must be available to perform on any Symphony Orchestra Concert during the spring semester of the 2021-2022 season; winners will be assigned performance dates based on what is best for the orchestras' season program, though concerti are usually scheduled for a performance at the 7:00pm Teen Arts Festival Concert on Sunday, February 20, 2022.

Choosing a piece:

- The piece must be 12 minutes or less in length. If the piece is close to 12 minutes in length but exceeds the time limits slightly due to variations in performance, the student must contact the CKYO music director in advance for approval. A student may play more than one movement from the same work provided the total performance time does not exceed 12 minutes.
- The piece does not need to be a concerto in title. Students may select a piece that was conceived by the composer as one for soloist(s) with orchestral accompaniment and that can be performed as such.
- The piece must be from the classical period or later. Pieces with instrumental accompaniment for small chamber ensemble or strings only, etc. will not be accepted. Be sure to get your piece approved by the music director well in advance of preparing it.
- The piece must be in print or readily available to rent or borrow.
- Note—if a student wishes merely to use the competition as an opportunity to receive feedback from the judges, then he or she may play any piece that adheres to the above guidelines. If the student wishes to have the best chance to win, he or she must choose a piece that showcases his or her unique talents—one that is challenging but does not overwhelm the student technically.
